- Eduardo Martinez, eduardo\_martinez@ci.richmond.ca.us, Mayor of Richmond: Green/Blue New Deal Workforce Development planned for the city of Richmond; 5/20, 10:00 to 12:00, in-person workshop at Recreation Center in Richmond, and on Wednesday, a virtual workshop to see how we can all work together to make this happen (Ogie: i.e. 5/24 labor-focused webinar?); also, we have been talking to developers to find out how the Port of Richmond can be a center for this Green/Blue New Deal for the construction of the offshore windmills. Also, at the last City Council meeting, we approved a contract with Raven, who makes hydrogen out of green waste, so the hydrogen that we make will have practically no pollution. It will be taking methane from the Republic waste and converting it to hydrogen, and they recycle the CO2 to do the process. I was lucky enough to appoint B. K. White, Vice President of Steelworkers Local 5. He was a former employee at Chevron, so he has a vast understanding of the process, and so he's helping my office figure out what's real and what's not real, what's right and what's wrong.
